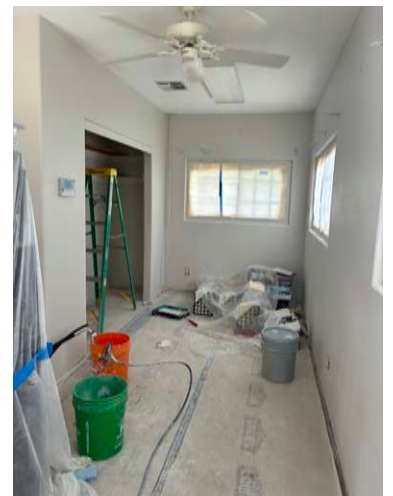
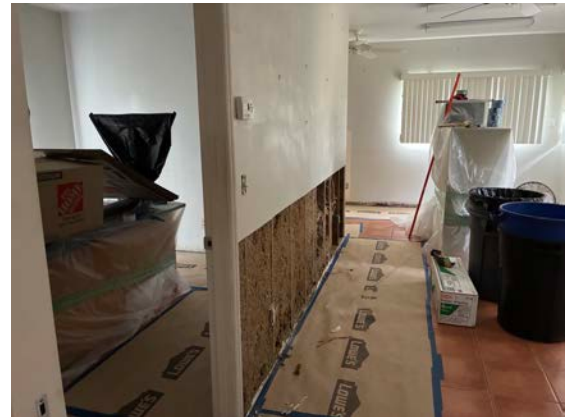
News from the Church Council

We are very thankful to announce receiving gifts from two generous donors. First, we received \$1 million from the Burke 'Ohana to establish an endowment in their name. As you may know, we only spend income from endowments while not touching the principle. The income will really help us meet our operating expenses year after year.

Second, we received a donation of \$470,157.09 from the George Peters Ferreira and Eleanor Linda Burns Ferreira Trust. The Council will be determining how to distribute these funds.

The Council has formed a Pastoral Support Committee comprised of the members of the Search and Call Committee. We have received three training sessions from our Associate Conference Minister, Jonathan Roach. The members are Bruce Burkitt, Edie Kapiko, Linda Somera, Thom. Probst, and Tom Nelson. Feel free to contact any of the Committee members with any concerns/questions you may have regarding pastoral issues.

The church office flooded during the last Kona storm and is currently being renovated to mitigate for the mold in the lower part of the walls and kitchen cabinets. We have moved items out of the office into UHaul storage pods while the work is being done. We have temporarily moved the office operations to the *Hale Pule*. We received a settlement check from our insurance company to cover the repairs.



Book Club visitors

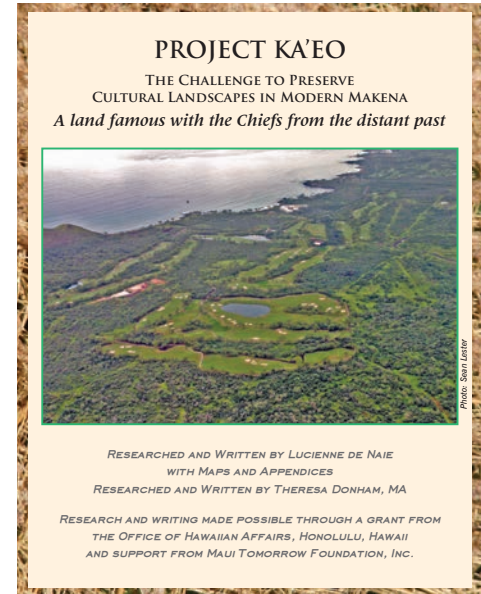
Lucienne de Naie in March: Project Ka‘eo

In March, the Keawala‘i Church Book Club discussed a captivating non-fiction volume entitled “Project Ka‘eo: the challenge to preserve cultural landscapes in modern Mākena.” Researched and written twenty years ago by local historian Lucienne de Naie and archeological researcher Theresa Donham, the book was the brainchild of Maile Lu‘uwai, who wrote an OHA grant on behalf of Maui Tomorrow Foundation to fund the project and honor her family (the Kukahiko’s) and others who had deep roots to the area. The selected chapters reviewed by the book club members



offered a deep dive into the last few hundred years of Mākena’s history. Co-author de Naie was on hand to answer questions, share old maps and enjoy the exchange of personal stories among book club members. Members were gratified to hear that since the Ka‘eo Project book was released in 2007, local archaeological preservation plans had changed and hundreds of acres of the 1,800 acres owned by Mākena Beach and Golf Club have been designated for preservation of historic and archaeological sites. *Mahalo* to club member, Colleen DeLima, for suggesting the book.

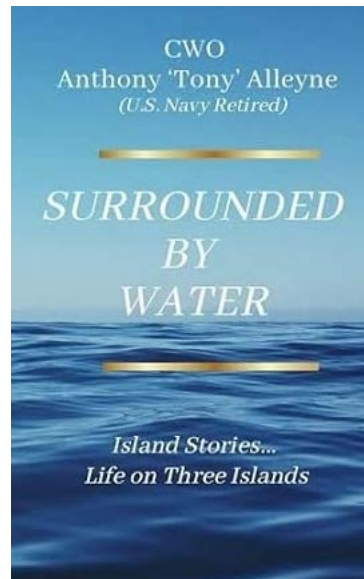


Tony Alleyne in July: Surrounded By Water

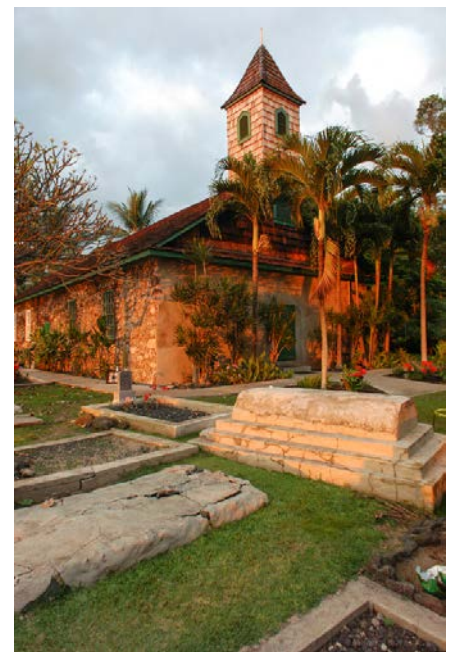

David's ashes were interred at Maui Veteran's Memorial Cemetery on June 9, 2026.



Steve Riford - January 17, 2026

February 29, 1924 - Auburn, New York

July 20, 2025 - Kihei, Maui

A memorial service was held for Steve Riford and his ashes were interred in the columbarium. Many, many members of the Riford family attended the memorial service traveling from more than 10 states and other countries. Steve was a longtime resident of Kihei having moved here in 1988. He was a former State Senator from New York state and was a WWII Veteran.

Auntie Eleanor served as a liturgist. She also sang as a soprano in *Nā Leo Nahenahe*, the church choir. She was always gracious in welcoming *malihini* (newcomers) and *kama‘āina* (old-timers) on Sunday mornings.

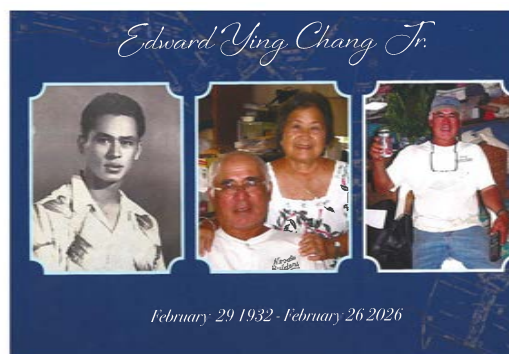
Tracy Fonville - memorial held January 3, 2026

On Sunday, January 18, 2026 *Kahu* Kealahou Alika was invited to serve as the pulpit supply pastor at Keawala‘i Congregational Church. The morning service included a time to recognize and celebrate his 29 years of service to our ‘*ohana* and the wider community of Maui by conferring upon him the honorary title of *Pastor Emeritus*.

The service included the Rev. Dr. David Vasquez-Levy, President of Pacific School of Religion (PSR), Berkeley, California; the Rev. Dr. Alan Akana, PSR alumnus & Pastor of Koloa Union Church on the island of Kaua‘i and Michelle Estrellado, Executive Director of Development & Strategic Partnerships at PSR. All were present to highlight a campaign to raise funds for the Kealahou Alika Scholarship Endowment Fund. *Kahu*’s first name – Kealahou – means “a new way” or “a new path.” It is appropriate that the scholarship will provide future Native Hawaiian and other Polynesian pastors with a new beginning as they prepare to serve congregations throughout Hawai‘i.

Kahu Alika’s ministry at Keawala‘i Congregational Church (UCC) uplifted countless lives with his warm welcome, deep compassion and unwavering commitment to justice and the well-being of indigenous Hawaiian communities. His influence extends throughout Hawai‘i and continues to shape all who have been blessed by his ministry and leadership.

He received his Master of Divinity degree from PSR in 1979. Upon graduating, he served as the Director of the Pacific & Asian American Center for Theology & Strategies (PACTS) from 1979-1984. He later served as an Administrative Assistant for Mission & Evangelism for the Presbytery of San Francisco, Presbyterian Church USA from 1985-1991. He was ordained into the Christian ministry on January 24, 1988 at Sycamore Congregational Church in El Cerrito, California.

TWO SCHOLARSHIPS AT PACIFIC SCHOOL OF RELIGION (PSR)

1. Kealahou Alika Scholarship Endowment Fund

As an alumnus of PSR, *Kahu* Alika has been a strong proponent of supporting Native Hawaiians seeking a career in ministry. Two scholarships have been established at PSR. The first scholarship was established in 2003 when *Kahu* received a Distinguished Alumnus award. Known as the Kealahou Alika Scholarship Endowment Fund, the initial endowment provided a modest scholarship for those preparing for Christian ministry. The Fund gives priority to Native Hawaiian students followed by students from the Hawaiian Islands, other Pacific Island communities and then other students with demonstrated financial need preparing for ministry.

A 12-member delegation from Keawala‘i Congregational Church travelled to PSR in the Fall of 2003 to attend an event when the award was presented and the endowment was announced. Lei Reichel, who was serving as the Administrative Coordinator of Keawala‘i at that time and Dr. Puakea Nogelmeier, *Professor Emeritus* who taught Hawaiian language for 35 years at the University of Hawai‘i at Manoa composed *He Mele Leialoha No Kealahou Alika*. The *mele* was presented by Lei at the event.

Under the leadership of Michelle Estrellado, Executive Director of Development and Strategic Partnerships for the seminary, a fundraising campaign was initiated and launched in December 2025. The fundraising goal was met within four months thanks to gifts received from numerous donors throughout Hawai‘i, across the continental U.S. and from other countries around the world.

It was at the 2026 ‘*Aha Pae‘āina* of the Hawai‘i Conference, United Church of Christ held at Waipahu United Church of Christ from June 11-13 on the island of O‘ahu, that Estrellado announced and introduced Kahulu Nunokawa as the first recipient of a full-time scholarship. She is a fourth-generation member of Ko‘olau Hui‘ia Church in Anahola, Kaua‘i.

Born and raised on Maui, her family moved to O‘ahu where she attended and graduated from the Kamehameha Schools, Kapālama Campus in 2017. Kahulu went on to receive a Bachelor of Science degree in 2021 from the University of Southern California (USC) as well as a Master of Science degree in Computer Science from Syracuse University in New York in 2024.

2. The Alika & Burke Family Scholarship Endowment Fund

Larry Burke Sr. of Pleasanton, California is an Associate Member of Keawala‘i. Through his very generous philanthropic gift, the joint-fund has an endowment that can provide two full-time scholarships for those preparing to serve in Christian ministry.

Larry is the father and father-in-law of Larry Burke, Jr. and Robin Burke of Kīhei. Larry and Robin are longtime General Members of the church.

The second scholarship was established this year, in 2026, under the name of the Alika & Burke Family Scholarship Endowment Fund. It provides support for one or two students each academic year. It also gives priority to Native Hawaiian students or those born and raised in Hawai‘i who intend to serve in ministry in Hawai‘i after graduation.

If no students meet the criteria, priority will extend to students from other Pacific Island communities to plan to serve their respective communities. If there are no qualified applicants who meet these criteria, the scholarship may be awarded in accordance with PSR’s standard scholarship policies. When multiple students qualify, awards will be based on financial need and other institutional criteria.

While there is no separate scholarship application process, students for both funds are considered through the admissions and financial aid review process. All scholarship opportunities are evaluated based on the background of each student, their vocational goals, financial need, and alignment with each donor’s intent.

Tanisha Wilson, Manager of Program Growth for Theological Leadership (TEL) & Congregational Renewal Cohort (CRC), will be in consultation with members of the Hawai‘i Conference, United Church of Christ to identify potential students as the seminary seeks to engage and support leaders throughout Hawai‘i.

The Burke family also provided the Keawala‘i with a generous gift in support of its ministry.

Douglas Chun and Keawala‘i

Painter, gardener, avid traveler, Douglas has spent a lifetime seeking experiences that nurture his soul. Born in Guangzhou, China, he attended the Honolulu Academy of Art and the San Francisco Art Institute. His firm, Chun / Ishimaru, served the design and architectural professions in the Bay Area. After a 35-year illustration practice, he retired and focused his energies on painting what delights him. Living simply on the slopes of Haleakalā on Maui, overlooking the Pacific Ocean, Douglas enjoyed tennis, gardening, cooking and the appreciation of fine wines.

Douglas’ watercolor and acrylic works are in private and public collections worldwide. Besides originals on paper and on canvas, his limited editions and open editions, published by Ericksen & Elins Fine Art and Editions Limited, are being distributed in both northern and southern hemispheres.

Douglas passed away in Kula 9 years ago and his wife, Janet, gifted Keawala‘i Congregational Church with poster copies of his original watercolor of Keawala‘i. There is a limited 42 copies that the church is selling for a suggested \$50 per print (plus shipping). Prints are approximately 24” x 30” in size. If donors would like, they can also offer more for the limited posters as the money will go to Keawala‘i’s Outreach Committee. The Outreach Committee meets once a month and decides who in need will receive these funds. Such examples of this showing *Aloha* into our community is in helping families getting needed brakes for their vehicles, paying back rents and bills to avoid homelessness and the absence of necessary utilities. The recipients of these funds are grateful and often send a heartfelt thank you to the committee. *Mahalo* for supporting this wonderful group of women and our community.

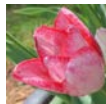
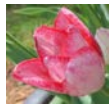
Outreach is going strong

The Outreach Committee meets once a month to review grant requests from the Local Mission Fund. These grants benefit individuals and families in need who reside in Maui County. Partial or full grants are made based on the assessment of each applicant's circumstances. Throughout the year we have fundraisers to support this mission, with 100% of fundraising going to those in need. We had a bake sale in December of 2025 (left). In lieu of a golf tournament this year, as there are many other nonprofit agencies being served by fundraisers, Mākena Beach and Golf Resort gifted Outreach \$10,000 to assist us in helping our neighbors in need — a big MAHALO to them. Included here are real life stories that we share with our congregation during church service announcements to keep them informed of the impact that our Outreach program has on those lives touched by *aloha* and kindness.

We assisted a female applicant who was behind by a large amount in rent due to losing her employment because of medical issues. She put as many resources as she could toward catching up and to stay current on her rent payments. Since she was working so hard to make progress, including using her 401k to make a larger payment, she was commended for her efforts and was granted continuances by the State Housing Department to become current on her past due balance. She was able to borrow some of the amount she needed and our Outreach program assisted her as well so she could become current.



We received a thank you letter last month from someone we helped in 2014 with a grant for program fees at Mālama Family Recovery Center. She is an addict but was helped to better herself and make progress through this program. Once she recovered and became free from her addiction, she moved off Island to continue her sobriety. She now has her life back, she has a job, a house, a few dogs and feels normal. She acknowledged that a lot of people end up turning back to their addiction but she did not. Because of the generosity of programs like ours, she was able to get her life back. She feels so fortunate and is so very grateful!



A male applicant applied for rental assistance who was a sole caretaker of his 31 year old disabled daughter. He applied for part-time work or at home work jobs so he could earn a living while his daughter received nursing care after being hospitalized. We assisted him to help him catch up on his rent so he could stay housed with his disabled daughter.

These are only a few examples of those lives touched by love and kindness, the fruit of the Spirit. Please feel free to support our mission in prayer or financially. Also, we have a small gift table under the pavilion where all proceeds go toward our outreach mission. God bless you!

We are also paying for temporary storage containers.

We are hopeful and excited about growing our '*ohana*. I am actively exploring ways to invite younger families throughout South Maui into this sacred space and into the loving community that makes Keawala'i so special.

Recently, I created a short video on our website sharing that while Keawala'i is widely known as a historic Hawaiian church cherished by visitors from around the world, it is also home to an extraordinary '*ohana* that cares deeply for both this church and one another with *aloha*. I feel incredibly blessed to now be part of that '*ohana*.

As we continue to honor and listen to our *kūpuna*, I believe Keawala'i is also called to become an even brighter light upon the hill in Mākena — a place where we share the message of Jesus and the spirit of *aloha* with our families, our community, and all who enter this sacred place.

Personally, I cannot imagine serving anywhere else in the world besides Keawala'i. There are many beautiful churches throughout the world, but as all of you already know, this place is truly unique. That is why I write to you today. Together, we have the privilege and responsibility to care for this sacred space — a gift created through the *aloha*, faith, and sacrifice of our *kūpuna* — so that we may continue sharing that same *aloha* with generations to come.
